This project seeks to encourage ORCID adoption at Cornell by offering a standalone, easily-remembered landing page for creation and confirmation of ORCID iDs by anyone with a Cornell Net ID. The target audience will be postdoctoral associates and graduate students unlikely to have access to Symplectic Elements through school or college-level support, and who may not have created VIVO profiles for themselves. With individual user permission, orcid.cornell.edu will also share confirmed ORCID iDs with Symplectic Elements, VIVO, and with central administrative units such as the Graduate School.


